The Lipper Award

Each year the Lipper Award is given to an individual and/or organization for contributions to the development of numan creativity. This year the OM Association proudly presents the award to Dr. Sidney J. Parnes, Professor Emeritus of Creative Studies at the State University at Buffalo and Chairman of the Board of the Creative Education Foundation. For the past

40 years he has conducted a wide variety of management and creativity workshops, seminars and institutes, both in the United States and abroad, for personnel in business, education and government.

He had conducted several extensive research studies on the nurture of creative behavior. His most important books include A Facilitating Style of Leadership; The Magic of Your Mind; Guide to Creative Action and Creative Actionbook; Assessing Creative Growth, Books I and II; Toward Supersanity: Channeled Freedom and its Research Supplement; and A Source Book for Creative Thinking. Presently he is concentrating on research into imagery and the creative problem-solving process. He is on the Advisory Board of Journal of Creative Behavior.

The Lipper Award is in honor of Arthur Lipper III, trustee of the Lipper Foundation, early supporter of the Odyssey of the Mind Program and the award's first recipient in 1981. Other recipients include Dr. E. Paul Torrence, Bill Jones and the Chevron, Charles Clark, Walt Disney and The Walt Disney World Company, and Dr. Paul B. MacCready.

- Sixth place in Cro-Magnon Division II was incorrectly announced at the Awards Ceremony. The correct team is Shepherd School from Washington, D.C.
- The Vernal Middle School team from Utah, competitors at World Finals in OMER to the Rescue, Division III, is composed of five team members. Four of these team members, classified as special needs students, include one deaf student and one hearing impaired student. This was the first year these students experienced OM and had no problems competing. Coaches Bill Thomalla and Nancy McKee worked as a coaching team. Nancy teaches hearing impaired students; and, therefore, knows sign language. As quoted by Bill Thomalla, "The team members had a great time at World Finals. They said it was the best thing they have ever been involved in and want to do it again next year. Competing in OM gave them a lot of self-esteem."
- Extra congratulations to the Decision Structure, Division III team sponsored by the Retired Ashwaubenon Firemen (Wisconsin). The team members, without a coach for the entire year, became world champions.
- Cable News Network (CNN) and WTBS, cable stations from Atlanta, Georgia filmed at World Finals. One segment was featured on "Science and Technology Week" and another short segment on "Good News."
- At the Program Governance Committee meeting, Karen Verbeke was reelected to the OM Board of Directors to serve a three year term of office.
- This is the first year that teams from Mexico and Manitoba have competed at World Finals. They were great competitors.
- Marina Jones served as OM's interpreter for the Mexican team during the spontaneous portion of the World Finals competition. Marina also spent a great deal of time with the team. Everyone loved the Institito Technological Y de Estudios team and we feel certain they enjoyed their first experience with Odyssey of the Mind.
- The Odyssey of the Mind Littlest OMER Award goes to Patsy Wright, Tennessee Association Director. Two weeks after the Tennessee state finals, her son was born. He attended World Finals as the youngest spectator.
- Having a disc jockey at the Coaches' Recovery Party

WORLD FINALS ROUNDUP

The 1987 World Finals at Central Michigan University May 29, 30, and 31 was the best one yet. Six hundred and two teams, representing three Canadian provinces, forty-five states, and Mexico, competed on Friday and Saturday in this our eighth World Finals.

Marcy Mager and Regina O'Brien, Association Directors from New Hampshire and Georgia, co-directed the pep rally. Highlights of this year's World Finals included a pep rally where each participant help up a flash card for the various activities.

This year an additional activity, the OMER of the Year Contest, was entered by one person, a team member, coach or chaperon. OMER had to present a self photograph, make a ten-second statement to the audience, and wear a costume designed by the team.

The Division IV World Champions from Bowling Green University in Ohio displayed their Leonardo da Vinci spring car at the creativity festival and drove it for the spectators after the coaches' competition.

The outdoor **Awards Ceremony** turned out great. Each individual association could be spotted by its different tee shirt. Participants sat in the stands and chanted "IBM, IBM" as a tribute to the many nice things which IBM had provided for the World Finals.

Thanks to the 176 judges, problem captains and scoreroom officials who helped insure the success of this year's competition. These volunteer judges paid their own transportation costs to Michigan and put in two grueling days of work and, yet, they were fair, competent, and courteous to all the teams. The heat wave put a slight damper on the World Finals, but the competitors left contented knowing that the judging was fantastic.

SPECIAL THANKS TO IBM

Each participant at World Finals received a brightlycolored red three-ring notebook and a beautiful poster both compliments of our corporate sponsor, IBM. In addition, IBM furnished a five by twenty feet yellow banner with Odyssey of the Mind printed in red which was displayed in the arena.

CREATIVITY FESTIVAL

The Creativity Festival at World Finals was great! This was our first festival ever. Each association had the option of participating in the festival by developing a creative game either as an entire association or by individual teams. This game was then used to lure World Finals participants "to pay" for the right to play the game. A bag of tokens, complimentary with each team registration packet, served as the "money" used at the festival. No real money was used.

Central Michigan University's Finch Field House was sectioned by the usage of stage drops. Associations participating in the festival were given the usage of 15' by 15' booths similar to those at state fairs to do their games. Special activities at the festival also included performances by Bonzo the Clown, demonstrations of creative chemistry, mime ensembles, demonstrations of robotics, a magician, and "Computer Fun" presented by Creative Learning Systems from San Diego, California.

Activities were extremely imaginative. Southwest Ontario's booth had a mannequin, which when kissed, gave a printout of the person's kissing power. Rodent Roulette had a mouse running on a roulette wheel. When it stopped, the winner was indicated by the hole with food the mouse chose. A watermelon spitting contest, panning for real gold, hand painting and numerous other activities made the festival quite successful.

Nancy Misner, coordinator of the Festival and incoming Michigan Association Director, worked exceptionally hard making certain that the festival ran smoothly. She had great support from other Michigan Association personnel who worked long hours at the festival.

The following article, written after World Finals by coaches William Brown and Sandy Hill, is about one of their special team members.

Seven minutes have lapsed. Creative Arts Workshop's Division II team slides the last pieces of its Mouse Trap Circus into their Chain Reaction places.

The drive wheel falls from the battery powered car. Clint picks it up calmly. He spins the loose wheel, spots a rubber band on his teammate's wrist, reassembles the car, replaces it, and steps back. The reaction fires. It misses the estimated time by only 9 seconds: a strong fourth place finish. "That was problem solving," Clint says with a smile as he leaves the floors.

Clint's early school record did not anticipate his skill, his finesse, or his motivation. It is thick with reports of developmental delay, immaturity and impulsivity. Clint's teammates also bring unusual histories to OM.

The da Vinci School at Creative Arts Workshop in New Haven, Connecticut trains students who are visual and spatial learners: extraordinary builders and artists whose talents are poorly measured by the reading and writing tasks of most schools. Clint's teammates' superb minds are partially masked by stuttering, dyslexia, and dysgraphia.

"We look at biographies," explains program director, Wm. Brown. 'da Vinci, Newton, Franklin, Rodin, Picasso...there's a long list of creative giants with 'unpromising beginnings' in school. Each need his talent recognized. We find the OM problems recognize and awaken talents."

In Clint's words: "Sometimes you need to show off what you can do best. In school they don't care much about my cars, my drawing, or even my cartwheels in gym. Did you see those coaches' battery cars? A lot of people here care about the things I care about. That feels good."

A REMARKABLE COACH

Students frequently tell us they cannot convince someone to coach their teams due to innumerable excuses from the prospective coach. The most frequent excuses given to the students by the solicited coach seem to be lack of time and inadequate renumeration for coaching. For the past three years, Burnt Hills/Ballston Lake Middle School students did not have problems finding a willing coach.

Chester Guild, Professor of Computer Science at SUNY-Albany and teacher of computer programming, coached five Odyssey of the Mind teams during the past three years. Since a swimming accident eleven years ago, Chester has been paralyzed from the neck down and confined to a wheelchair. This past year, Chester coached an "OMER to the Rescue" team and a "Decision Structure" team. One of his teams has attended the New York finals each of the past two years.

According to Chester, the most frustrating occurrence about coaching was when he introduced his two "Compound Fracture" teams to balsa wood. Having no previous knowledge of balsa wood and how to use glue, the team needed to be shown. Chester couldn't physically show them how to cut the wood. Although coaching baseball and scheduling of baseball officials are two of Chester's volunteer activities, Chester states, "I love OM. It's my favorite."

With his super outlook on life, Chester feels that handicapped people should try to make the best of their situations and proves it by example.

Next year, the Guild family is moving to New Jersey. It will be New York's loss and New Jersey's gain.

OM BOARD BRIEFS


Approved at the May 31, 1987 meeting, the following is a synopsis of minutes from the September 27, 1986 OM Board of Directors' meeting.

- Chairperson Carole Micklus reported a membership total of 4,446 members total for the 1985-86 membership year. For the 1986-87 membership year OM will offer an associate membership.
- The 1985-86 annual report was accepted.
- OM will delay any action for the use of the name "Olympics" until the pending case by another group is resolved.
- An ad hoc committee was appointed to investigate the pay scale for OM employees.
- The revised 1986-1987 budget was accepted.
- The World Finals participants' costs will be maintained at a rate no lower than that of the previous World Finals.
- The membership fee for the 1987-1988 year will be \$90 per membership.
- A professional fund raiser will be hired to initiate a fund raising campaign.
- Several names were mentioned as possible recipients of the Lipper Award.
- James Madison University and the University of Maryland were discussed as possible sites for the 1988 World Finals.
- A scholarship committee report indicated Chevron will offer \$8,000 in grant monies for 1986-1987.
- A draft of the Association Directors' Handbook was previewed.
- Collegiate workshops will be given at various sites. The ITEA/OM Collegiate World Finals will be held in Tulsa, Oklahoma, March 26, 1987.
- An OM Board of Directors' Certificate for Service will be awarded to people who aid the operation and purpose of OM.

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
