## NASA & Odyssey of the Mind --Partners In Creative Problem Solving

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has partnered with the Odyssey of the Mind to develop an Earth science problem for the 2001-2002 program year. Dr. Sam Micklus announced the NASA sponsorship to a cheering crowd at World Finals Closing Ceremonies on June 5.

NASA is sponsoring Problem 2, *OMER's Earthly Adventures*, the technical/performance problem. They wanted a problem that would address environmental responsibility while incorporating creativity in an instructional and innovative atmosphere. The sponsorship helps fulfill their goal of stimulating interest and learning of Earth system science among all age groups.

NASA will provide other support services throughout the year and has already developed a special Web site, http://earthobservatory.nasa.gov/odysseyofthemind/, for Odyssey members. NASA scientists and engineers will attend the 2002 World Finals to talk with participants about educational opportunities and careers in Earth science with NASA.

According to Odyssey of the Mind Program Director Sammy Micklus, "NASA is a natural partner for Odyssey of the Mind. Our mission is to develop creative-thinking skills in individuals; their goal is to find individuals who possess those skills -- both for the purpose of building a better future."

## World Finals Highlights

orld Finals 2001 was a fitting end to a great competition year. Held at University of Maryland, College Park, the friendships made and the experiences gained are now cherished memories. Here are some highlights:

• 677 teams competed, representing 33 U.S. states and 15 countries.

• North Carolina took home the most trophies with six overall; both New York and Florida each claimed five.

• **Poland** sent the most teams from any international association -- 11 -- and took home two gold medals; **Germany** ranked second in international participation with 6 teams.

• Uganda was represented for the first time with two teams, making this the first year of WF participation for the continent of Africa.

• **Peter Rosenstein** represented **NAGC** in accepting the Odyssey of the Mind Creativity Award (*see page 4*).

• **Dr. Karl-Ernst Plagemann** received the Odyssey Spirit Award for his work in growing the program throughout Europe. He also gave the commencement speech at Graduation.

• The popular Lithuanian singing group *SMILE* performed in a special pre-Awards Ceremony concert.



Houbai Prim Sch, Beijing, CH Achilles' Heel, Div I: *This individual showed exceptional creativity in portraying a mouse being chased by a rat without talking. He conveyed the message with body language, facial expressions and choreography. Without speaking he showed his exuberant personality.*

Techno-Pets, Div III: This team showed outstanding creativity in its unusual approach to the presentation of this problem. They presented a high-risk, non-verbal solution. The team's theme of laundry was incorporated throughout its solution. Sets and costumes were constructed of laundry-related items. This team knocked the judges socks off!

*Team:* **YMCA Gdynia**, Poland Idiom Inspiration, Div I: *This three-member team presented an extraordinary creative solution by using minimal props. The*  role of the main character was passed seamlessly from member to member, creating the illusion of one performer. This team showed that less is more!

Team: Monroe Mid Sch, CT Wild.Winged.Wonders. Div II: This team showed exceptional risk and creativity in the design of a team member's wings. The team made the costume out of actual live, growing grass. The resulting piece of grass material worked beautifully as dramatic visual wings. The grass wings significantly enhanced the ecological theme of the solution.



Team: Roswell HS, Roswell, GA Wild.Winged.Wonders. Div III: This team took major risks in every aspect of the solution: their mile-high moving sculpture, their life-sized Tiki doll "Earl," and their self-animated short film blended Henson-worthy puppets with fantastic political wit.

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### COACHES: CREATIVITY LOVES COMPANY

The Odyssey of the Mind benefits children of all ages with different interests and abilities. We know it and, because you're involved, you know it, too. So why don't more schools participate?

Many districts enter every one of their schools in the program. Why? Because school officials are aware of the benefits the program brings. If your district does not enter all of its schools, then spread the word.

Your school board and superintendent may not be familiar with the Odyssey of the Mind: its long history, how it teaches teamwork, how it allows students to develop their creative problem-solving abilities. Brochures and letters can explain the program, but they cannot provide personal testimony to express its true value and impact on students. The best advocates are coaches, parents, and even team members when it comes to bringing this message to school officials.

Attend a school board meeting to let members know why their schools should get involved. Meet with principals and administrators and tell them how your team members have benefited from participation. In many districts, participation in Odyssey of the Mind fills a void in the regular curriculum; in some districts, it is integrated into the regular curriculum.


