## The 1997 OM World Finals: Opens With Sparkle, Closes With Anticipation

he 1997 OM World Finals kicked off on Wednesday, June 4, 1997, with OMER leading the University of Maryland's marching band into the Cole Arena for Opening Ceremonies. Here, World Finals participants from 17 countries (including England and Scotland representing the UK) converged to celebrate the start of an event that is now 18 years old.

Representatives from each association and country followed OMER and the band, waving flags and banners that represented their country. Participants in the stands greeted the marchers with symbols that depicted their respective state, region or country. This resulted in a wave of icons ranging from saxophones to cheese heads to pink flamingos to ten gallon hats...and it went on and on until the lights dimmed for the laser show and fireworks grand finale.

The mood was festive for the entire event, allowing participants to forget about any obstacles that they overcame — natural disasters like floods in North Dakota, unforseen occurrences like vandalized or damaged props, and the memories of the fanciful, frantic fund raising that took place just one month before.

After three days of competition and comradery, the awards ceremony's masters of ceremony announced the champions while 16,000 OMers and their supporters cheered. After 730 teams competed, awards went to 112 teams — including six champions that hailed from countries outside the U.S.: China, Curacao, Ontario, Japan, Poland and Russia. Ohio OM garnered ten places — including honorable mentions; three AR OM teams jubilantly carried home trophies for first, second and third place; and two *Double Trouble* structure teams from VA and SC held more than an amazing 700 pounds! We also remember welcoming Panama and Peru as first-time World Finals participants.

And, after the last OMer was homeward bound, we were left to ponder next year's problems (see the synopses on page 2) and to look forward to the 1998 OM World Finals at the WALT DISNEY WORLD® Resort, May 27-May 30, 1998. See you there!

### "So Now You're On An OM Team!"

This new video makes learning about OM exciting and fun!

lashback! It's your first OM meeting. "Who are these people? They're speaking a language I don't understand. What's up with that T-shirt that has a picture of a raccoon on it? Panic! And who belongs to all these funky clothes and props? Why are those kids over there pointing a glue gun at me? And what do "spontaneous" and "brainstorming" mean, anyway? What am I getting myself into? Maybe I should bolt!"

That first OM meeting can sometimes be intimidating for newcomers to the OM experience. We all know it takes a while to discover our creativity, experience the dynamics of teamwork, and learn new problem-solving skills, That's why the crack OM script writers and video producers have put together a brand new videotape called, "So Now You're On An OM Team!"

This 25-minute journey through the OM program begins when Brittany Conway, a twelve-year-old OMer from Atlanta, Georgia, has a close encounter with one of her neighbors the day before her first OM meeting.

Brittany's mind flies through all the doubts and questions most OMers experience when they sign up for OM. Her neighbor, Mrs. Long, an expert on OM, decides to give Brittany a look inside the "official" OM Command Center. Before you know it, through the miracle of videotape, OMers from all over the world are telling Brittany why they joined OM and how much they have enjoyed the "OM experience." Several coaches also explain OM from their viewpoint.

All of the nuts and bolts of belonging to an OM team are presented, too. Snippets of long-term and spontaneous problems are shown and explained, along with discussions and demonstrations of Style, brainstorming, creative problem solving and OM competitions. References to support materials from the OM home office, special video effects and weird music are all there for you, too.

The important roles that OM coaches and parents play are explained to Brittany (and the viewer) so everyone can clearly understand how a team functions in relationship to its supporting adults. Hey, Brittany even gets a quick look into an Imagination Factory, where a rookie recruit is learning the OM way of being creative!

So now you — as a coach, a parent or an official — have help in presenting OM to rookie OMers. Let Brittany and a cast of thousands reassure those first-time OMers that being on an OM team is going to be one of the great experiences of their lives.

# Synopses of the 1997-98 Long-Term Problems

#### Pageant Wagon (Divisions I, II, III and IV)

The team's problem is to design and build a Tow Vehicle and a Pageant Wagon, and to present a festive performance that includes a Grand Finale. The Tow Vehicle will be powered and driven by a team member(s) and will tow or push the Pageant Wagon around a course. The Tow Vehicle and the Pageant Wagon will carry all of the team's props. The Pageant Wagon will be used as part of the set for the performance. During the performance, the Tow Vehicle will travel the course and show off to attract interest in the Pageant Wagon. In addition, the Pageant Wagon will perform a task during the Grand Finale. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$100 (U.S.) value.

#### Morph Magic (Divisions II, III and IV)

The team is to create and present a humorous performance that includes a character who undergoes a morph from human to animal. In animal form, the character will find some plight of an animal that it will help or learn something to help it solve a human plight. The performance must also include a team-made device that will morph from its original appearance into something else. All of the team's props must fit inside a limited space. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$100 (U.S.) value.

#### Classics ... Marvelous Mentor (Divisions I, II, III and IV)

The team is to create and present a humorous performance about an advertising agency that has been commissioned to make a television commercial about a nutritional product. The agency has the good fortune to have an acclaimed individual as a mentor for the project. The performance will include the commercial, original music, a team-created package for the product, and a discussion of the product's nutritional benefits. All of the team's props must fit inside a limited space. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$100 (U.S.) value.

#### Camouflaged Creation (Divisions I, II, III and IV)

The team will design and build a Camouflaged Structure made of balsa wood and glue. This may be stained and/or painted and will be camouflaged as part of a Larger Creation. During the performance the team will remove the Camouflaged Structure from the Larger Creation, then test it by having it support weights. The team must create and present a theme for the performance, and all of the team's props must fit inside a limited space. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$100 (U.S.) value.

#### Create & Animate (Divisions I and II)

The team will create and present a humorous performance where an inanimate object comes to life. The performance will include a team-created poem or song and original music. In addition, all of the team's props must fit within a limited space. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$90 (U.S.) value.

#### **Dream Vacation** (Primary)

The team is to create and perform a skit about a Dream Vacation, which must include two sights and an experience at each sight. The performance will also include a Main Character and a team-created song. The time limit is 8 minutes. Materials used cannot exceed a \$50 (U.S.) value.

# Got your "got milk?®" T-shirt?

The National Dairy Council (NDC), a proud sponsor of OM, created excitement at the recent OM World Finals in College Park, Maryland, by rewarding the accomplishments of over 6,000 participants with a got milk?® T-shirt. Many OMers recognized the popular ad slogan made famous by the "Aaron Burr" spot, just one in a series of got milk?® commercials. The spot ranked eleventh in the "50 Greatest Commercials of All Time" by Entertainment Weekly magazine, beating out such notables as Nike, McDonalds and Diet Pepsi.

All World Finals participants were eligible to receive a **got milk?** T-shirt by completing a form with these three simple, open-ended statements:

- My favorite "Get Moving" activity is:

"We used the T-shirts to capture the OMers' attention to discuss breakfast, an important part of learning and peak performance," says Tab Forgac, M.S., R.D., L.D., Vice-President of Nutrition Education for NDC. Forgac goes on to state that she hopes the T-shirts serve as an ongoing reminder to OMers that a quick, easy and nutritious breakfast gives students a mental advantage.

A recent survey commissioned by NDC of 600 8- to 13-year-olds confirms the responses received of OMers at the World Finals. Students prefer the breakfast basics. The survey found that cereal remains the top choice, with over 55% mentioning it as the item eaten the last time they had breakfast. Other prominent breakfast items include milk (38%), toast/bread/bagels (19%) and pancakes/waffles (10%).

Another interesting finding of the NDC survey is that 50% of students fix their own breakfast. "It stands to reason," Forgac points out, "that without guidance, students may not be making the best breakfast choices. For example, only half of the older students choose calcium-rich milk as their morning beverage." As a coach of these performing students, you have an opportunity to reinforce the breakfast learning connection by encouraging students to eat a balanced breakfast.



The team presented a unique approach to solving the problem. Their setup and plan were risky and so different that the judges had to double check the rules. The final results were less than the team envisioned, but the attempt was truly creative.

Lilburn, GA

Exceptional creativity was shown in the design of a unique steering control system. This utilized a "piano roll" style paper tape which ran over a set of photo cells. These sensed the holes and operated the vehicle's steering mechanism to guide it around the course. Although this device broke down, the team continued their performance.

**OMERDROID**, Division I

**Long-Term Team Award:** SOUTH LEBANON ELE SCH Lebanon, PA

This *OMerdroid* solution was built around an incredibly creative set that almost provided more information than the judges could absorb. The entire set was built into a single package that utilized video, mechanical scrolls, spring driven shelf units, and a spectacular presentation of the robot.

Long-Term Team Award: LAKESIDE JHS

Hot Springs, AR

This team which consisted of five actors, four humans and one droid, portrayed a tennis match between sophisticated British Royalty and Arkansas Country Folk.
